- This exchange of ideas, experiencing the working culture of each country, and the forging of friendships across borders are good outcomes of globalisation and something we want to encourage.
- Not everything about globalisation is good. But we want each Seminar participant to focus on the benefits of globalisation and use it to their advantage. Get to know other cultures, contribute towards improving the world.
